# PALMERSTON NORTH SEARCH & RESCUE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING 29/3/72

The Club's S.A.R. delegates, Kevin Pearce and Russell Johnson attended this meeting. Police Sgt. K. Wrigley, read to the meeting from records kept, Search & Rescue activities in the district during the past 12 months. There were 11 Class 2 Operations, 7 Class 2 Alerts, 7 Class 1, which could have developed to Class 2, Operations. (Class 1 involve Police only, but Class 2 includes civilians with a civilian Search Controller.) There were 2 close to shore searchers that were not included in the records. Both were in relation to flares used at sea. Mr. Meyer, Otaki, who mentioned these 2, commented that the Japanese fishing vessels were causing some inconvenience by using various coloured rockets to recall their fishing dories.

It was decided that later in the year we should hold a Trial Search involving Mountain personnel and Close to Shore (Boating) personnel. It was also decided to hold, if possible, first aid evenings where the finer points of Rescue first aid could be discussed.

Mr. I Dodunski (P.N. Surf Life Saving) advised the meeting that a 16 ft. unsinkable Hamilton Jet Rescue Craft was being purchased for use along the coast.

Would all those interested in this type of voluntary work please contact Kevin or Russell. Exceptional fitness is not essential because some searchers involve only a search of flat areas where numbers only are required.

## WARNING

The F.M.C. in their February bulletin, have published a warning from the Electricity Department that "River levels can rise very rapidly downstream of Hydro-Electric dams and control works. The public are warned to take extreme care. The danger is obviously greatest within a mile or two downstream of Hydro Power Stations and control works and this Department has erected warning notices at many points of common public access."

#### TRAMPING EQUIPMENT

Equipment recommended for tramping on tops of mountain ranges or snowcraft. e.g. Tararua Crossing.

- 1. Raingear (overstrousers)
- 2. Woollen mittens (waterproof overmitts useful.)
- 3. Sun or ski glasses.
- 4. Woollen headgear (e.g., balaclava)
- 5. Long woollen trousers.
- 6. Suncream (Snowcuffs helpful.)
- 7. Extra dry warm clothing.
