#### TRIP REPORTS

## 23-24<sup>th</sup> March KAPAKAPANUI -- NGATIAWA - RENATA

We started off from Ngatiawa farm, as a gentle run, and later a sprint, catching up with the day trippers many times. Finally we made Kapakapanui Hut, where upon, the Non-Conformist sat down corrupting himself with a Play-Boy. ## 9<sup>th</sup> MARCH POHANGINA SADDLE

The newsletter has continued to be a vital organ and if it is kept going in its present form, shall always be of great interest to members near and far.

Your Committee met on twelve occasions during the year and attendances have been good. At the beginning of the year they purchased three ice axes and five pairs of crampons, and this month a new primus and a second nylon fly are being purchased for the hire gear.

I have enjoyed being your President again this year, and I wish you all good tramping in the future.
