Search and Rescue Food Requirements

Those who have volunteered for SAR are reminded that food for four persons for one-day is to be carried by each person unless specifically instructed otherwise at the time of call up. This requirement is for breakfasts, and dinners only. Lunches, and scroggin are to be for one person for four days.

This rather complicated arrangement allows a four man team to operate for four days in the field, and greatly simplifies meal preparation. Those who have indicated that they are keen to be called out are expected to have one four-man dinner, and one four-man breakfasts already prepared, and on hand at all times so as to facilitate a rapid turn out at short notice.

SAR volunteers are also reminded to come equipped with full storm gear, camping equipment, and torch on all callouts unless specifically instructed otherwise at the time of call out.

Items for the Newsletter.

PAST EVENTS

The Reform of Brad Owen Tongariro 13-14th July

Only three out of seven made this trip due to work, the (too) common cold and cetera. Arete Forks and Glaciation 27-28th July

The black dotted line on the map seemed rather unlikely. It indicated that the track followed the stream bed closely. A route up a spur seemed a much more likely prospect in view of the well known steep and gorgy nature of the streams draining the Tararuas Tops.

We waded the river opposite the hut with some difficulty, using mutual support and then crossed Arete Stream, also with difficulty. The track soon left Arete Stream and did indeed follow close to the side stream. The going was good. Soon we were in wonderland. The nights rain had reduced snow cover but there was still sufficient left to give a real alpine character to the small glacial valley we were ascending. The steep slopes and cliffs under Bannister streamed with water, Fiordland like. We crossed moraine and even an avalanche track through the scrub (probably 2 years old). Were we really in the Tararuas? The track through the scrub was excellent and soon we were mounting a tussock ramp to the saddle between Bannister and Waingawa.

The drag back along Blue Range was rather an anticlimax. Those taking part in this Kiriwhakapapa -- Cow Creek Hut -- Arete Forks -- Waingawa -- Kiriwhakapapa -- were Kevin Pearce, Trevor Bissell, Tim Short and Keith Margrain.
