COLOUR SLIDE COMPETITION RULES

- 1) A competitor may enter any number of slides.
- 2) A slide may be entered in one class only.
- 3) There will be two categories:-

Novice, those who have not previously been placed in a slide competition. Veteran, all others.

- 4) There will be three classes; all which must have a tramping or mountaineering flavour.
 - a) <u>People</u> -- those slides in which trampers and other mountain people constitute the main interest.

4)cont. b) Natural History -- Flora and fauna. c) General -- slides where the interest is predominantly scenic. No slide previously entered in a P.N.T.M.C. competition may be 5) First and second places will be awarded in all classes. The 6) judges decision is Final. Each slide must be accompanied by an entrance fee of 5c. 7) First places winners will receive two thirds the money collected in 8) the class the balance going to the second place getter. To ensure slides are projected the right way all slide frames 9) should contain a dot in the bottom left hand corner when held in hand for viewing. The entrants initials should appear somewhere on the frame. 10) All entries must be handed to either Trevor Stretton 28 Carroll Street, or Russ Johnson, Bas Johnson Garage Main Street by 14/4/75. i.e. a week before the competition. 11) LATE ENTRIES Late entries will be accepted up to the evening of judging if accompanied by a 5c late fee in addition to the 5c entry fee. 12) Each slide must have been taken by person under whose name it is entered.

Rule No. 9 maybe deleted from the section and in its place read:- All prints must have the entrants name or initials on the back and maybe titled.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT (for the year ending 28/2/75) Ladies & Gentlemen.

It is with pleasure that I present the Ninth Annual Report of the P.N.T.M.C.

During the year the Club has run trips on 47 out of the 52 weekends, there being 24 day trips, 51 weekend trips and 3 Xmas and New Year trips, a total of 78 trips in all. Some of the trips of special interest were Easter 74 around Mt. Egmont, and the Xmas-New Year trips in the Kaimanawa range, Olivine Ice Plateau and The Rees and Dart River Valley.

The Club has also been involved in interclub activities with M.U.A.C. (debates and gourmet dinner), M.T.&S.C. (netball and soccer), and The Combined W.T.Cs. Sports Weekend (in which we had runners in both the junior and senior marathons). All those taking part in these activities seemed to enjoy them to the full and I hope that the Club keeps this up in future years.

Club members have been active in S.A.R. and S.A.R.Ex., I would like to thank all those who have taken part in this essential community activity. Our Club hut at Rangi has had work parties up to it to clean it up, dig new rubbish holes and to set the new stove safely in place. We have also got some novalite sheets from the Forest Service for the roof, which will have to be installed this year.

Throughout the year our gear hire has had some increases and replacements, with new billies to replace old ones, new ropes, new primusis, also one of the tents has had a floor put in to it. The Club this year put in for a subsidy from the Ministry of Sports and Recreation and have received the sum of \$82.00 to be spent on hire gear.

The Club has seen a decline in membership this year from 91 members last year to 70 members this year but it is good to see that there are still very active groups going out every weekend.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committee and all those who have helped to keep the Club going with trips, newsletters, and club night activities.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear

I would be grateful if you could put the following in the newsletter of the Club as unfortunately I missed the Annual Meeting of the Club and assuming you are still on the Committee.

Dear P.N.T.M.C. Members you'll notice that the title of our Club is Palmerston North Tramping and Mountaineering Club, and although it appears to me most of our members that participate in (fit and above) tramping trips can run "RINGS" around other Tramping Clubs I am familiar with it seems to me a disservice is being done by trying to 'Divorce' Skiing from mountaineering or in other words proficient Skiing is an INTEGRAL part of mountaineering if one wants to take up Mountaineering seriously.

Judging by the travels of Sue Streeter and Lawson Pither on the Continent their experiences would . . probably reinforce this fact and the New Zealand Alpine Institute has compiled a system or syllabus for grading Mountaineers for Instructors certificates and not very high up the grading is the requirement of proficient skiing requirement to pass the examination and thus earn as certificate an accredited 'instructor' of Mountaincraft teaching others for \$20 per day and upwards. (fees etc). I am referring to Members who may wish to take Mountaineering 'seriously' like Hoare, Margrain, Dixon, Darragh, Streeter, Croad, Stretton, Short, Bissell etc.

Anyone would be impressed with the agility of Graeme Dingle as a mountaineer and I have seen him also as a Ski Instructor on Ruapehu teaching School Physical Training teachers, and he-Dingle Skis like a deft-footed angel.

The Palmerston North Branch members can for the cost of \$5 only join the Manawatu Ski Club and have the use of their lodge and Ski rope tow on Ruapehu at members rates (the tow being free. The club owns it.) This is cheap compared with other outfits like the Feilding based Summit Skiers Inc. whom charge and entrance fee of \$50 plus annual subscription of \$15..

I am sure that our members as well as being crackerjack trampers would become top-notch Skiers as well both on the Snow and Grass types of skis should they decide to have a go and a visit to Manawatus Ski Captain Terry Kilinster at Y.M.C.A. would prove useful to get the dope. Terry is playing an active part in organising the 'Come Alive' activities in the Manawatu at present.

By the way, congratulations to Keith Margrain whose initiative and enthusiasm provided the dialogue and competition with Manawatu Trampers on the Sports field last year.

PAST EVENTS

8-9th MARCH RUAHINE CORNER? -- ARANGA HUT

Having entered the Field at 1900 hours on Friday 7th March the "expeditionary force" made good progress as far as the Waipawa Bridge on Highway 50.

Assistance was rendered to the driver of a "motorised bucket" (excavator); his vehicle had crashed through the railing of the bridge and was lying on its side in the river. Trooper Pearce acquitted himself in a most commendable fashion during the affair.

At 0800 hours on 8th March W.M. Porter of the Golden Downs Station willingly gave permission to cross his land. The line of advance lay through beautiful beech forest on the Golden Crown Ridge and Fort Aranga was in allied hands by lunch time.

Valuable information was obtained from Fort Records in the area and an interesting excursion was planned using these.

Satisfactory progress was made over Piopio, trig V and north along Long Ridge. The unit then pursued the elusive Hill 3375 ft. which moved steadily away as the unit advanced.

After several miles the chase was abandoned the group dropped 1000' to the Ikawatea River to camp the night.

During Sunday 9th March the unit hit the Fort at Ikawatea Forks, reconnoitred the area and trekked overland to Fort No Mans for lunch. The route home lay over Ohawai and down Golden Ridge.

A stop was made at Waipukarau hospital to visit Jim Antonio who thankfully had not incurred any serious injury in his accident.
