Christmas Trip to Arthurs Pass

Bookings have been made for 12 people to travel:

- 1) From Wellingto to Lyttleton on Dec. 29th by ferry
- 2) From Lyttleton to Arthurs Pass on Dec. 30th by railway,
- 3) From Arthurs Pass to Lyttleton on Jan. 14th by railway,
- 4) From Lyttleton to Wellington on Jan. 15th by ferry.

The cost of the above fares will be \$21.80 each. Extra money will, be required for fares from P.N. to Wellington and back and possibly from Hokitika to Arthur's Pass at some stage. The cost of party food has not yet been estimated.

A number of shorter tramps (2 or 3 days) will be done in the area initially to reduce the weight of the packs a little and then it is hoped to finish with a Three Pass Trip.

Breakfasts, dinners, puddings and hot drinks will be organized but people should take their own lunches, cold drinks and scroggin.

PAST TRIPS

15-17th AUGUST NO MANS – RUAHINE HUT

A wet Friday night, drove over numerous back roads north of Dannevirke which brought the party to the Big Hill station and a comfortable camp site in some trees. The key to the gate on the Big Hill was obtained from the manager in the morning.

Having driven Dick's sheep down the road to the Big Hill stream the party crossed the stream and followed a 4 wheel drive track on the south side to the Herricks Hut. A sidle track skirted above some steep cliffs above the stream and eventually returned to the river bed.

Dead Dog Hut is marked 300' above the river on a prominent ridge it is not! It is sited on the river's edge some distance upstream (grid ref. 752290). A left turn at the next fork upstream and a right turn at the forks above that was assumed to be the best route towards No Mans Hut. From the first waterfall, the party climbed out onto the ridge between No Mans and Lessong Monument. The remainder of the walk to No Mans was along a Forest Service Access road which travels to the very tops of the Northern Ruahines at 4200'!

Next day after viewing the country to the north of the Ruahines forest, for an hour or two, the party set off for home via Herricks Spur. This spur involved much up and down traveling with no source of water in its whole length. The Golden Crown Ridge, which was traversed by the club a year ago, provides a much more interesting walk.
