PAST TRIPS

EASTER, 1976: OPERATION KENEPURU

MISSION: to locate the Ryan Monoplane, flown by Hood and Moncrieff from Sydney in 1928 with the intention of making the first Trans-Tasman flight from Sydney to Trentham.

<u>SEARCH AREA</u>: Marlborough sounds, Kenepuru Head to Mount McMahon.

We left Porirua Harbour by Cessna Float Plane and were dropped at the head of Henepuru sound. We then journeyed by foot to the Mount McMahon area and looked in places of high probability for $2\frac{1}{2}$ days.

An old farmer had seen a plane or similar object high on the slopes of Mt. McMahon in 1928 but did not associate it to Hood and Moncrieff as he was unaware of their attempted flight. It was recongised by a big dead forked tree covered in the dreaded bush lawyer. Other people saw fires in the same area but half-dismissed it as hunters or the like. But a search was carried out, (very basic as it was pre-SAR times), boot prints and leaf paper were found, but these were inconclusive evidence in the theory that the plane crashed in this area. Although identified as a plane, it could never be located by a ground party.

After 48 years all we could hope to find was a radial engine, crankshaft and glass windscreen. As was half expected we did not find it, but nevertheless a most enjoyable tramp in a new area.

On the way back to Picton we walked around the glorious little bays and coves that abound in this area.

Progress was yet again slow and it was not until we reached Field's that we knew we still had ten toes, or was it nine? Here we met the day party who only threw abuse, no praise, at us so we had no alternative but to wait till we reached the farm land and then put the tail enders to shame as a scouting group ran past them (not to be misread to say 'Scout group' as in Girl Guides) with ice axe fixed.

Moral: "He who can will, but he who can't can only try." In other words it's all free enterprise.
