NATIONAL PARKS BILL, 1980 (from F.M.C. special News Bulletin)

LATEST DEVELOPMENTS

On Wednesday, 9th October, 1980, the Minister invited representatives from FMC and other organisations to his office to discuss amendments to the Bill. AMENDMENTS

The Minister is proposing significant amendments to the Bill. Clauses which it is proposed to amend are:-

4 (1) Improved definition of National Parks.

4 (2) (b) Preservation principle reverts to Authority.

8. Approval of Minister no longer required for investigating new proposals.

16 Nominees now on the "recommendation of" organisations.

17 Authority now has power to advocate, otherwise little change.

18 Reverts to wording of present act – a very significant gain.

27 Minister will now consult organisations.

Little change proposed except to appointment of Honorary Rangers and advice on implementation of Management Plans.

30 Boards will now be appointed following "consultation with" the Authority.

43, 44 and 45 Role of Boards clarified in regard to Management Plans. Commissioner removed in most clauses.

Federated Mountain Clubs is far from happy regarding clauses 17 and 28 dealing with the functions of the Authority and Boards. We will continue to press as we did in our supplementary submissions for the management of National Parks to be retained by Boards.

ACTION - URGENT

You are urged to contact your local member of Parliament and remind him that the following remit was carried at this year's National Party Dominion conference:

"NATIONAL PARKS – THAT THE GOVERNMENT BE URGED NOT TO TRANSFER MANAGEMENT FROM THE PRESENT APPOINTED BOARDS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDS AND SURVEY."

RANGI – HOWLETTS TRAVERSE AND BACK

It was obviously going to be a good trip – pouring rain; Feilding, Cheltenham, Kimbolton still the forecast sounded reasonable for Sunday. Fortunately it wasn't raining at the car park. The cloud was entered at the swing bridge, but remarkably conditions remained dry until we dropped out of the cloud beyond Mangamahue.
