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## **RANGI HUT**

The Committee has approached the Ruahine Forest Park Advisory Committee seeking its support in having the Forest Service replace Rangi Hut. This action, which was precipitated by recent criticism of the Hut's condition, recognizes that the Hut is nearing the end of its useful life. Rangi is probably the most visited hut in the Ruahines because of its accessibility by a graded benched track and its commanding position just above the bush line.

At the moment the Committee has no firm views on the nature of the new hut, but is thinking along the following lines:

(i) sleeping accommodation for 16 persons on platforms rather than individual bunks,

(ji) ample space for day visitors,

(iii) hut to be built on or near the present site,

(iv) the Club would make no financial contribution to the cost of the new hut as the tens of thousands of dollars involved are quite beyond our means,

(v) replacement to be as soon as practicable, i.e. within 2 – 3 years.

The Committee was divided on the question of whether the hut should be equipped with a stove. Some felt that the sub-alpine scrub could not support the collection of firewood. Others feared that if no stove was supplied, some users would build open fires outdoors.

A strong case can be made for Rangi's replacement and a favourable response from both the Advisory Committee and the Forest Service seems likely. Members are invited to make their views on the above and related matters known to the committee.

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## PAST EVENTS

### Orienteering – 5 July – Kohitere Forest

Trampers are good at orienteering! Only five members turned up in rather threatening weather for the Club's first orienteering event, which was organised by the Red Kiwis Orienteering Club. It was held in a steep pine forest near Levin.

Novices Chrissie Elliott and Don French teamed up and won their first 1.1 km 7 control D course in 16 minutes. Not far behind in 6th place were the novice pair Catherine Farquhar and Nora Flight who took only 25 minutes to complete the course.

Encouraged by these successes Chrissie entered the B course (2.9 km, 10 controls) and came second in the stunning time of 59 minutes. Cathy and Nora were 8th in the same event completing it in 90 minutes. Old hand Kevin Pearce entered only the A course (4.5km, 14 controls) and managed 6th place in 102 minutes while Don came in a creditable 13th in 131 minutes.

The team enjoyed their day and are planning to do more. Orienteering has much to offer the tramper who can only get away for an hour or two and who wants to maintain physical fitness and improve navigation skills.

### 20 - 21 June - Mid Winter at Rangi

Various people, at various time, all heading up to our own little hut in the Ruahine Ranges for our mid winter get-together.
