PAST TRIPS

KAPUNI LODGE – 16 - 18th JULY

Friday Evening

Dawson Falls arrives, time to wake up and put on a great show of enthusiasm. Warm skin and cold sleet, just the combination for character building. So after a minor detour, we retrieved the prodigal pack and lined up for some glissade practice. After exhibiting a variety of descent postures, to the hut contingent, we tackled the leatherwood again and settled in at the hut with great expectations for the morrow.

Sunday Morning

No such luck! The general consensus is that it's pit bashing weather. However, by smoko time us hyperactives were on the move again practising our white-out navigation en route to Syme Hut. After a few moments of self-doubt we blundered into Syme toilet! A few minutes of hacking at the ice found us in the shelter of Syme Hut. We gave the 'Philips' five minutes to catch up but as their astronavigational computer terminal was on the blink, they had just decided on doing a few circumnavigations of Phantoms Peak before returning to a more civilised climate.

18th July 1982 – DAY TRAMP TO THE NGAMOKO RANGE

Five of us set off on an overcast morning and, after some indecisive road navigation, ended up at the Umutoi North Road roadend. Some further problems were encountered in reconciling the layout of the recently altered road end with what appears on the map, but when we found the track up to the tops we made good progress. While we went up, the clouds came down, accompanied by some strong gusty winds. Above the bush line snow covered everything except the tallest tussocks and leatherwood bushes as we made our way to the nearest summit (un-named, 4550 ft at GR 512781) which we reached at noon. After testing the water in the rain gauge we retreated to the relative shelter of some leatherwood clumps (they have their uses) for a cold lunch, before making a swift descent from the wind, cloud and sleet to somewhat more clement conditions below.
