#### 4) Tararua management plan

Club members may have noticed a recent article in the Palmerston North Evening Standard reporting a public meeting held in Levin on proposals for the Tararuas. Topics discussed were the proposed removal of non-essential marker poles in the open tops and up to 21 of the 58 huts. Ecological areas will be given the highest level of protection. The

next level of protection (class two) covers most of the Park and no expansion of recreation facilities will be permitted. Some road endings will be given special Class 3 status for passive recreational development and easier walking tracks will be developed in conjunction with these. More details can be found in "Tararua Conservation Park - a discussion paper for the management plan review". Club members are urged to make submissions and the discussion paper is available from the Department of Conservation at a cost of \$1.

### 6) Open Club Christmas Trip

We intend to spend up to 10 days in or near the northern fringe of Mt Aspiring National Park, possibly in the Blue, Young, Siberia and Wilkin Valleys. #### TRIP REPORTS

### 8<sup>th</sup> August - Harris Creek Hut

This tramp was graded as an easy trip so an early start was made. However, both cars decided to go on strike after we'd stopped to use the phone at the Bower House to check the road conditions. With much patience and tinkering Darren managed to get the car going and off we went to the top dam hoping that nothing would stop us on the way. As for getting the cars started for the homeward trip, well.....we would worry about that after the tramp. Fortunately there were no problems.

With Terry and Clair leading the way we made good time following the track all the way up and arrived at Harris Creek Hut at about 11.45 am. Lunch was had down by the river boulders. Even though it appeared more sunny on the other side of the river it was decided that it was not worth crossing over and ending up with wet feet. That can wait for summer when although the water isn't much warmer the sun is and the breeze is not so chilling.

On the return Terry and Clair decided to take a short jaunt down the river and then because the dam was full they rejoined the track before the lower bridge. Is the watch still working Terry?

## 5<sup>th</sup> - 6<sup>th</sup> September – Kawhatau, North Western Ruahines

It was a small group that assembled on Saturday morning. We arrived at Kawhatau after 2 hours of following (and deviating from) a winding road. The weather was lousy, with occasional drizzle, but undeterred we set out. The start of our tramp featured a cable way across the Kawhatau River and then a long steady climb up onto the Hikurangi Range. At river level we had been enclosed in forests of beech and totara trees but as we climbed these gave way to smaller plants more suitable for higher altitudes and harsher weather. At about 1300m the bush finally relented and we followed a poled route along the Hikurangi Range. The view, which would have been spectacular, was lost in the mist and plans to continue along the range to the summit of Mt Hikurangi were abandoned. We descended to Crow Hut arriving in time for lunch. As soon as we arrived at the hut the weather cleared but none of us had the enthusiasm to climbed back up the Hikurangi Range. Instead we spent the rest of the afternoon sunbathing.

Although Sunday dawned fine it had been cold and wet overnight and a fine dusting of snow could be seen above the bushline. We crossed the Kawhatau by way of a swing bridge and headed up a spur on the true right of the river. Another 1000m climb from forests to tussocks and we were on the top of the flat-topped Patea Range. With a bit more snow it would have been ideal ski touring country. We took a leisurely 3 hours to walk along the range to the Colenso high point. Views that we had missed the day before lay below us. To the northwest the volcanoes of Tongariro National Park dominated the landscape.

We descended to the car down a very muddy track that was definitely more suitable as a downhill track. Home to Palmy, stopping only for ice-creams.

#### 19-20<sup>th</sup> September - Ngamoko Range/Pohangina River

Several shots announced that the rifle range was in use as we walked in to the Heritage Lodge. Nearer to the lodge the sound of a chainsaw could be heard; the local branch of the Deerstalkers Association were out in force recutting the track up to the Ngamoko Range.

Care was needed near the bushline to avoid being hit by lumps of snow falling from the canopy. A quick lunch was taken on the top of Tunipo while we desperately added extra items of clothing. Visibility came and went as we plugged steps in the snow northwards along the range but the wind was moderately strong and cold. The correct spur was located and we descended the cut track to the Top Gorge Hut in the Pohangina Valley.

The hut had two bunks and a concrete floor but provided adequate shelter for the five of us and three shooters. Four slept on the floor on three mattresses and two slept on each bunk on closed cell foam mats.

One or two of us may have had dry backsides on arrival at Leon Kinvig Hut the next day. More serious immersion was avoided by climbing above pools in the gorge, sometimes on tracks. After lunch at Leon Kinvig we climbed the track to Toka Peak. Very little snow remained but the weather was rather unpleasant so we continued immediately down Short's Track to Limestone Road.

#### <u>3<sup>rd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> October - Mitre Peak</u>

An early start for the team on Saturday morning, leaving Palmy in sun and passing through the odd shower on the way to the Waingawa River, eastern Tararuas.

Our walk was going to take us to Mitre Flats, up Mitre, over Brockett, down to Cow Creek Hut, then out via the Waingawa River on Sunday. That was Plan 'A' but we ended up reverting to Plan 'B', which meant dropping gear at Mitre Flats, going up Mitre for the views (and the wind as it turned out!) then back to Mitre Flats Hut for the night. Not a bad walk, a bit easier going with lighter packs!

An interesting night was had in the hut which we shared with a couple of people. We didn't realise that Plan 'B' involved listening to childrens' stories on Sunday morning but we hadn't heard some of them.

We had a leisurely walk to the car down the Waingawa River bed and couldn't have picked a better day to do it. If you don't mind wet feet it's the way to go - quite pretty and recommended by all of us as an alternative to the track. Plan 'B' wouldn't have been complete without an icecream - guess why we stopped at Eketahuna.

#### 4<sup>th</sup> October – Coppermine Stream

Yet another easy wander up Coppermine Stream (that's what it's called on the map). This time to try and find the main mine shaft in operation from 1887-1930. About 3 or 4 shafts were mined between the north and south branches of the valley up from the hut. The mineralised vein containing copper and iron was discontinuous and not enough for production. This gives the interesting red and green rocks found in the stream. The greywacke that makes up the Ruahines and other ranges in NZ has localised mineralization. Besides this mine (known as Maharahara Mine) gold was mined near Wellington and manganese in the Motumati area of the Kaimanawa Ranges. Elsewhere in the Kaimanawas there is Gold Creek (also called Panoko Stream) but this may have been due to "fools gold" (iron pyrites) being found there or the golden glow of the tussock.

Enough of the geology! Back at Coppermine we searched up the first side stream on the true left of the South Branch - a steep scrubby stream. John Barkla and Julian Dalefield had come across it on a search some time ago and it was covered over with scrub. We didn't find it this time. We then headed up the North Branch to a shorter but easily located shaft at stream level. Inside was a large population of cave wetas so we left them to it.

The mine shaft investigators were: Alan Mountfort, Tina Alley, Inge Doepfner, Ian Kirker, Julian Dalefield and Terry Crippen.

### October 11<sup>th</sup> - Ohau Shelter

After a leisurely start from Palmerston Nth we arrived at the road end just after 10am. For those trampers who enjoy an easy tramp but were unable to join us, this trip is initially across a pole marked route - 2 paddocks worth. Over the style the bush track begins. The track is of easy gradient with some muddy patches. About 50 metres this side of the swing bridge there is the turnoff for the circular route. Markers on these tracks are above eye level so you have to watch out for them.

We arrived at the Shelter approximately one and a half hours from the car park and decided to adjourn to the river flats for lunch. Unfortunately it was about the same time that the sun disappeared and the air temperature became decidedly chilly with a cool breeze blowing down the river. In summer the river is really nice to wander down. Lovely swimming holes for pack floating but too cold at the moment as vouched for by Terry and John. They decided to bush-bash back up to the track where we met them. The return trip was made in the rain but we made it back to the cars before the skies opened.

Thanks to Janet for opening and shutting the gate in the rain. I think it had something to do with equality and equal rights. An enjoyable day had by all - Terry Crippen, John Thomson, Janet Baird, Monica Cantwell, Margaret Riordan, Liz Morrison, Tricia Eder.
