SNOWCRAFT PROGRAMME 2010 Preliminary Notice

PNTMC runs a comprehensive snowcraft programme. It has two aims: Firstly, to equip you with the necessary skills for safe tramping in snow, be it on winter trips, or summer trips above the snowline. Secondly, to pass on the fundamental skills of mountaineering.

The programme consists of three weekends up Ruapehu or Egmont, and a midweek evening session prior to each weekend. A progressive approach is used, with Snowcraft 1 assuming little or no previous snow experience and SC 2 and 3 building on the previous levels.

Most participants enrol in the complete programme, while others just in one or two of the weekends depending on their previous experience or ambitions.

SC1 evening Wednesday 28th July. SC1 weekend 31st July – 1st August SC2 evening Tuesday 10th August. SC2 Weekend 14th -15th August SC3 evening Tuesday 24th August. SC3 weekend 28th – 29th August

Fees cover weeknight venues, transport, weekend accommodation, most food, group gear hire, and instruction. Individual gear hire, if needed, is an additional cost for non Club members.

Campaign against Mining in National Parks and other Conservation Lands

John Key's 'State of the Nation' speech to Parliament on 9 February clearly spelt out the Government's intentions to review Schedule 4 land to be considered for mining despite numerous pleas from concerned individuals and organisations, such as FMC, for the Government to reconsider. FMC believe it is crucial to maintain pressure on the Government, especially with the imminent release of their consultation document.

You can help by doing some or all of the following:

Ruahines were more dominant in the PNTMC Newsletter. Rangi, Sunrise, Howletts, Takapari Road, and all the popular spots featured often. However, during the 2000's, I have noticed a definite, if subtle swing back to the Tararuas. My personal tramping diary shows this quite markedly, as I am more frequently seen in the My recent Ruahine exploits have Tararuas. been restricted to a few local day trips, and I enviously read of other PNTMC members exploring my old Ruahine haunts. Long may these explorations continue- with me please.

The newsletter of late is particularly attractive to me due to its broad interest base, wide trip report variety, and of course wide geographic coverage. Trip Reports

Howletts 20- 21 February By Graham Peters

This trip, organised by Grant Christian, promised to be a nice cruisy trip to one of the Ruahine's many superb huts. The signs were good with us leaving Grant's place at 10.00am on the Saturday morning. A slight disadvantage of this was that we left the car on the Kashmir road at around 12.30 with an immediate climb in the mid-day sun.

It was particularly tough on Geoff wearing a black cap - fried brains comes to mind. We eventually entered the bush and reached the ridge top for a late lunch. Having gained that height, we then lost it all as we dropped into the Tukituki and made our way through the short gorge section before a short break at Daphne Hut.

Having gained then lost altitude, we then had to regain it with interest on the initially steep ascent

to Daphne Ridge. A snack break on the bush edge before the relatively easy climb through the tussock to the ridge top and Howletts Hut for the night where we were the sole occupants.

The plan the next day was to carry on southwest on Daphne Ridge to Taumatataua before traversing the saddle to the Ngamoko Range. On the Daphne Ridge eagle eyed Geoff saw a couple of deer bedded down. I took some convincing even with my binoculars, but he was correct and eventually they moved off. Heading southwest.

On the Ngamoko Range we had lunch with a view above Pohangina Saddle before dropping down to Longview. A bit of a chat to a family who'd come in for a day hunt before the walk down to the carpark and couple of km along the road to the car. A good trip with stunning weather for being on the tops.

Mania Rangi Circuit 21 February By Woody Lee

We had enough number to split into two groups for swapping the keys; Mania team (Dave – driver, Craig, Anne & Martin) and was supposed to start from Mania road and Rangi team (Woody – driver, Warren and Mike) from Renfrew road end, and the plan was to meet at the highest tussock top at lunchtime. Mania team did not take a turn to their way in Rangiwahia and kept leading our way. We pulled over in the middle of Renfrew road to chat and Dave changed the plan to tramp together but Warren replied to him "No plan change" and finally Mania team turned back to Mania road.

(8:40am Rangi team at car park) Shortly after starting, approx. 10mins, Warren suggested to make a shortcut to the hut so we took left turn to get down to the stream and had a couple of

hours bush bashing and rock hopping before morning tea break. I discovered I had lost my water bottle somewhere in the bush or stream as it was simply tucked in one of side pockets (should not do this mistake again) but luckily I had a small thermos flask of hot coffee and refilled it with fresh water later. We ended up at a lovely waterfall and one more bush bash up the cliff for getting back to the main track, right before the arch bridge. 11:30am stopped at the hut to have a quick break and carried on toward the tops, spotting the others on the parallel ridge to the north and settling down for lunch for on top. We finally met Craig coming down from the peak, keen to get his lunch in Mike's pack (1pm). It was a great experience to swap the keys on top of the ranges.

At the bush edge at the top of the Mania track there was a signpost saying "3hrs to the car park" and it made me feel down because I was already tired and out of water, but we managed it in under 2hrs. What a great progress on a hot summer day (glad we weren't going up the steep track) and I appreciated Mike's kindness of sharing his water. No doubt the two heavily loaded deer hunters we passed on the tops would take longer.

Cattle Ridge the Long Way 27- 28 February By Peter Wiles

The prospect of a fine day on Saturday suggested it might be worthwhile to go to Dundas Hut via Herepai and along the tops and visit Cattle Ridge Hut on the way out on Sunday.

After a wonky start where Woody spent more than half an hour sitting waiting for Peter to pick him up, we were away by 7.30. (A reprogramming error took place in the leader's head on Friday between an agreed pick up at 6.30, and the later time of 7.30.)

At the Putara carpark, there was a WTMC van. This was a worry – where could they be going? At Herepai Hut, a hut entry showed that 4 were bound for Dundas Hut. Not knowing how many bunks there were, we wondered whether we might miss out.

As we emerged onto the open ground above Herepai we caught sight of the group about 30 minutes ahead. We reached Ruapai for lunch and could see the WTMCs approaching East Peak. Conditions were perfect. After a very brief lunch, we reached East Peak and met up with the WTMC party. We exchanged destinations and then moved past them to tackle the trudge onto West Peak. That was the last we saw of them, for some unknown reason. PNTMC 1, WTMC 0.

Woody started to get cramp in his leg, so we had a couple of stops. A drink and some salt may have helped. We passed Walker and finally onto Pukemoremore. With the perfect conditions, locating Dundas Hut was not a problem, but by then we were pretty tied. After locating the cairn that marks the turnoff to the hut and a steep drop over the side, the track took us quickly down to the hut. We settled in for the evening. The wind rose and it was quite noisy with the gusts shaking the establishment periodically.

Next morning the tops had some cloud over them, but that did not matter as we headed down the spur to cross the upper Ruamahunga River 600m below. Again we were in some luck as the track cutters had cleared the track earlier in the week. Crossing the river was easy, although there was some suggestion that there was a hand wire across it. This was not evident, but there was a coil of cable in the bush nearby.

The track up onto Cattle Ridge was similarly straight forward although quite steep and the gradient was sustained for the entire 600m. A poled route finally took us up a final scree and out onto the crest of Cattle Ridge. The wind was strong, but then we could see the hut over the other side. We had made good time so had a boil up of noodles for morning tea at the hut. No one was about.

Off again and down to Roaring Stag. Again steep initially but the track gradient eased out towards the bottom. We had lunch at the hut. Surprisingly, again there was no one at the hut on such a fine day. Woody was so impressed by the spot, he went for a quick swim. Shortly afterwards we were off on the final leg and reached the car about 3.30.

Lower Waiohine Gorge Tube 6 March 2010 By Tony Gates

Our planned weekend gorge tube floating trip to Mid Waiohine and Totara Flats was reduced to a day excursion for ease of transport. We tubed the Lower Waiohine Gorge, from the Walls Whare Road end down to the picnic area, without large packs, but still with large smiles and a lot of laughs. This tube floating is a great way to go, often said to be the best, with the most amazing Tararua river scenery on the way. It can be easy (relatively), safe (sometimes) and fun (always).

Our day trip was even further reduced due to a small flood at Clem Creek. We had a short tramp, then retreated back to Walls Whare road end to prepare tubes, wet suits, helmets, and dry bags. The Lower Waiohine Gorge was certainly in fine form despite chilly water and grey skies. The dozen or so rapids were cruised through with ease, with several floated more than once. The small flood didn't appear to raise water levels much, just silt levels. Subsequent checks of the Regional Council website however revealed a doubling of water flows from the previous day. I said that it was safe because, once sitting on a tube, it doesn't really matter what the water level is- you just float over (and through) the rapids. Definitely great fun.

We all chilled somewhat after about an hour. The final rapid presented a set of some eight standing waves in a row that we could plough through with great fun. We reached the picnic area a couple of kilometres down valley earlier than our booked car pick up, but all agreed on the need to dry out and warm up. Only when trying to remove tube valves did we realise how cold we were, with frozen, weak, and barely functioning fingers. A little warm sun on a black truck tube rapidly warms, and the picnic area shelter was good place to be. Next gorge tubing trip will hopefully be an overnight one- anyone else keen?

The weather played tricks on us all this weekend. Alasdair judged from the mountain forecast that it wouldn't be a goer, but as Anne and I were in New Plymouth anyway we set out on a cloudy Sunday morning expecting to do a Plan B walk. 
