A considerable number of joyous remarks such as "it's probably snowing up there" heightened our spirits as we set off towards Ketetahi and an easterly direction by foot and people who made these remarks went west in the Landrover. Included in this party was a new super-light-weight tramper who left his pack at Turangi and survived the weekend on two tins of food and donations from his colleagues of less initiative. The Landrover was taken to the base of the road at which a direct ramp to Ketetahi begins. This road is halfway through bush and the other half over rolling tussock land. The easterly party took a route through the South Crater, around the Red Crater through the Central Crater, around the Blue Lake and then to Ketetahi. We arrived at Ketetahi at about 1:30 p.m. to meet our smarter, drier and smugger half. The Ketetahi hut is well equipped with 22 bunks, kitchen sink, running hot water one way down the track, cold water the other way and about 200 yards upwards a refrigerator. Despite these luxuries complaints were heard concerning the lack of electric blankets and shortage of ice-cream.

Tongariro and then descending through Ketetahi and back to the road. The rest of the party went back to Mangatepopo via Central Crater and the highest point of Mt. Tongariro. We had more luck with the weather and a beautiful view of the course of Saturday's tramp. The craters and the lakes could be seen. At Mangatepopo we were once again united and after a piece of remarkable engineering required to make one of the cars move (namely, pushing) we returned to Palmerston North.
