28th June CLUB NIGHT

At the last Club Night a large gathering of members were entertained by Nic Bishop giving an illustrated talk on his journey through far eastern countries en route to New Zealand. His artistic ability with the camera was an inspiration for the many camera enthusiasts in the Club.

RICHMOND RANGE –QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY WEEKEND

A number of interesting things happened on this trip to the ranges between Blenheim and Nelson. Firstly was the precision timing of our boarding of the Picton ferry - slow driving conditions meant we had only milliseconds to spare. Secondly was the successful calculation of the numeric value of exponential "e" correct to five significant digits while at the Mount Richmond hut. An attempt at calculating "pi" (the ratio of the circumference to diameter of a circle) was abandoned because of the tedium of applying the Newton-Raphson method to the solution of $\sin(x) = 0$. We couldn't work out a more efficient method of making the calculation.

Saturday was cold and damp. Sunday and Monday were brilliantly fine with a hard frost which lasted all day in the shade. We started at Te Rou, 29 miles from Blenheim in the Wairau Valley and an easy four hour walk through pleasant beech forest brought us to Mount Richmond hut which was of the standard Forest Service design. On Saturday we traversed the rocky peak of Mount Richmond and headed south along the Main Range. It was narrow, bumpy, rocky, bluffy and interesting. A rope was used at one point to descend a steep ice-covered rock slab. Eric was so impressed by the fine weather that he abandoned his parka while pushing through dense forest, having left it tucked under his pack flap. Saturday night we camped on one of the few flat areas and found a trickle of water nearby. On Sunday we continued on to Ada Flat, Old Man and the picturesque Lake Chalice. A long drag east up to the Forestry Road reunited us with Karyn and Brent.

AVALANCHE ACCIDENT ON MOUNT COOK

Some time before 8.00 a.m. on Tuesday 2nd January, 1979, Club members Keith Margrain and John Williams were struck by an ice avalanche while they were descending the Linda Glacier after an unsuccessful attempt on Mount Cook. John was killed instantly and Keith died at the scene of the accident the following day. In one sudden and awful blow the Club lost two highly respected and valued members.

KEITH FRANCIS MARGRAIN

Keith was born in Palmerston North in 1957. He attended Palmerston North Boys High School from 1970 to 1973 and then Massey University, initially on a part time basis, graduating with the degree of Bachelor of Business Studies in April, 1978. At the beginning of 1978 he took up employment with a Christchurch accountancy firm.

Keith joined the Tramping Club in 1971 and soon came to notice for his quiet attentiveness and enthusiasm. He became a Committee member in 1974 and Treasurer in 1977 and also served for a period as gear custodian. His tramping with the Club began modestly with a day trip to the Ohau River but soon progressed to include trips such as a one day winter Southern Crossing, a Full Waiohine and a descent of Chamberlain Creek. He made many trips to the Ranges of both Islands including Egmont, Tongariro, Kaimanawas, Ruahines, Tararuas, Rimutakas, North-West Nelson, Inland and Seaward Kaikouras, Nelson Lakes, Arthur's Pass, Mount Cook, Westland, Aspiring and Fiordland National Parks. He was a keen rock climber, mountaineer, canoeist, skier and cyclist. His climbs included a number of peaks in the Darrans, Mount Aspiring National Park, the Mount Cook Region, including the Syme Ridge of Mount Tasman and many lesser peaks in other areas. He was active in Search and Rescue and was responsible for finding and rescuing a person buried in an avalanche on Mount Ruapehu in 1975. His incredible sense of balance, his unflappability and his skill at navigation made him something of an institution.

Keith took delight in simple things such as a snug camp high in the mountains, the purr of the primus promising warm food and the beauty and solitude of the mountains. He was an excellent companion, always cheerful and uncomplaining, energetic when there was work to be done, calm and quick acting in a crisis. Keith had many friends and his courtesy, modesty and common sense gained the respect of all who knew him. The community can ill afford to lose young men of Keith's calibre.

JOHN R. WILLIAMS (1946 - 1979)

I knew the Williams family before John lost both his parents a few years ago. They were a close knit family, well organised and ever willing to share what they had with others less fortunate than themselves. The family came from Britain when John was small, from the same area as myself, and they never lost their national characteristics. John was an only child and carried the family philosophies into his work, leisure and recreation. Consequently he was much sought after as a leader, chairman, councillor and companion.

We came to know each other very well from 1968 on since we shared for much of that time, the same accommodation, workmates, interests and friends. One of John's characteristics was his inability to sit still and he was always wanting to be 'doing' something. This led to his being involved in projects as varied as assembling a computer microprocessor to manufacturing a cattle crush. Generally, his interests lay in the great outdoors with a specialization in the ? individual pursuits rather than in team sports.

Tramping, skiing, canoeing and cycling had their turn and his enthusiasm for these activities infected others. He worked hard at these activities too and I remember one summer before a Christmas Tramping Trip that he was leading, he decided on a crash 'get-fit' campaign about a week beforehand. This involved getting up at '6 a.m.' (it was often 7.50 a.m.) having breakfast, donning his running gear and pack containing several bricks, tearing

out to Massey, swimming four or five lengths of the outdoor pool, crossing the road for a shower and climbing into his working clothes ready to start work at 8 a.m. After a day at the lab bench the performance was reversed and after tea there was the inevitable meeting to attend. John led about 24 people on that Christmas Trip to the South Island and very enjoyable it was too, mainly due to the good planning and forethought. John was very tired by the end of the trip which, if I remember rightly, ended in some very long grass behind a factory close to the railway station from which we were to depart the following morning.

Perhaps as a consequence of having been isolated in Antarctica in '72/'73, John was always a good companion with something constructive to say to everyone especially on wet days or when morale was failing although his impish brand of humour occasionally backfired. John never did things by halves and was always one of the 'boots and all' brigade which occasionally landed him in trouble. He was willing to take a calculated risk and I can remember a number of adventurous trips we had together. On 2nd January, 1979 John was enjoying himself as he had done for the whole of his life.

Although born in England John spent most of his early life in Wellington before coming to Palmerston North as an electronics technician for the D.S.I.R. in 1968. As part of his work John twice visited Antarctica, once during the 1967/68 summer cruise of the U.S. icebreaker "Eltanin" and the second time in 1972/73 when he wintered over at Scott Base.

John joined the Palmerston' North Tramping and Mountaineering Club in 1971 and became a committee member in 1972. He served on the committee in various capacities including gear custodian and was Membership Convenor at the time of his death. John was active in Search and Rescue and was Chairman of the Palmerston North Mountain Safety Committee.
