TRIP REPORTS

11-12th July – Introductory Snowcraft

The group departed Palmerston Nth on Friday night for Ruapehu turning off the Desert Rd up the road to the Tukino ski-field. The road became rather treacherous about 2 km from the track turnoff to Rangipo Hut. Although somewhat reluctant to get out of the vehicles it was a perfect, calm, moonlit night with an enjoyable 2 hour walk to the hut – no torches required. The next morning we set off up the mountain to practise cutting steps and self arresting. A smaller group went higher up the mountain and we met them later on in the afternoon on our way up to have a look at the Whangaehu Gorge.

The next morning the whole party set off west around the mountain to practise the skills learnt on the previous day. A lone pinus contorta tree was attacked by the more enlightened Aborta Contorta veterans among us. We returned to the hut in time for lunch and set out on the return trip shortly afterwards having to negotiate a rather steep slope which we must have climbed up in our sleep on Friday night with our then rather limited snowcraft skills. 1-2nd August – Makaretu Hut – Longview Hut – Eastern Ruahines

We left Palmerston Nth on Saturday morning expecting a wet weekend but as soon as we hopped out of the car at Moorcock Base the clouds disappeared (they must have seen us!). After the annoying farm track to Moorcock Saddle the real tramping began. We climbed a ridge, enjoyed the views and dropped down to the North Branch of the Makaretu River to cool our hot feet. We stopped at Awatere Hut for lunch, looking forward to the boulder through the great scenery of the river. The water was as clear as glass and the stones afforded a firm hold so we reached the junction of the south branch in the early afternoon. The boulders in the south branch were really greasy but it was so great strolling along in the bush that we passed Makaretu Hut. As the track started to climb we thought that we had gone too far and after a lot of compass work we found the hut right beside the track! The fire was already going but the hunters gave it up and shifted to Happy Daze Hut. We enjoyed our stew and the whole night without them. We just had trouble with the question: warm and smokey (window closed) or cold and not smokey (window open). ...

Next morning a brilliant and clear day made us jump out of our sleeping bags. We left the hut at 8am and climbed through the refreshing bush towards the tops. Under a marvellous blue sky we strolled along the leatherwood covered ridge but barely got a view of the snow capped Ngamoko Range. At one of the last sheltered spots we stopped for a short snack before we got up onto the windy tops. What a breeze but we made it to Longview Hut without being blown away. After lunch we rushed over the last wind exposed part of the track, took a last look at the Ngamoko Range and descended to calmer conditions. All of a sudden we found ourselves back at the Moorcock Saddle, in front of the farm track to the car.

9th August – Atene walkway, Wanganui River

It was a beautiful early spring day with some mist up the Wanganui River valley and the Atene Walkway in the newly created Whanganui National Park certainly lived up to its reputation. Described as a skyline walk it followed a circular route along the ridge tops the whole way. We did the trip anticlockwise starting from the Wanganui River Rd just past the little village of Atene. For the first leg of the trip we climbed up through the mist to the Taupiri Trig. The second leg continued around with views of Ruapehu to the right and the city of Wanganui to the left. We came upon the second trig and descended down to a clearing in the bush with a shelter and water supply and stopped for lunch. After a short nap in the warm sunshine for some of us we continued on around with views of the Wanganui River to the right and the little settlement of Ahu Ahu made famous by its commune, the,"Ahu Ahu Ohu". To the left we could see an old, dry river loop made by the Wanganui River before cutting through and taking its present shorter route. The track gave way to an old roadway which eventually led into farmland and back to the road about 2 km upriver of the starting point. An excellent walkway of about 5-6 hours enjoyed by all.

6-8th February – A three day medium Southern Main Range, Tararuas

The Southern Main Range is normally done as an FE trip, often with a Friday night walk up to Field's Hut, from Otaki Forks. The idea was to use the long weekend to reduce the grading of the trip to medium/fit; good idea - yes/no? Read on!

Five hours effort took us up the Judd Ridge past Fields to the old Vosseler Hut site on Bridge Peak. Progress OK; decided to have lunch and continue north along the Main Range towards Maungahuka Hut. By McIntosh progress we were very slow & tired; decided to descend to the Pakihore Ridge to look for a campsite in the bush; 2 shooters directed us to a good one.

Next morning conference: out via Pakihore Ridge and Penn Creek or continue? Decision: continue. Tararua Peaks craggy and travel was very slow – arrived at Maungahuka at midday. Retreat back to Pakihore Ridge for the night and go out the next day; or continue? Decision: continue. Arrived at Anderson's Memorial Hut at 8pm to find that the hut was full, so fly camped nearby.

Next morning the weather was misty and drizzly with a wind blowing. We were overtaken by the other occupants of the hut a kilometre north of Anderson's. During the descent from Shoulder Knob to the Otaki River (and Waitewaewae Hut) we were overtaken by two of the other occupants again. They had wandered down the wrong spur in the mist and had mucked around in leatherwood for an hour before climbing up again for a second attempt. Our batteries were recharged by a leisurely lunch in the sun at Waitewaewae before the long drudge out (7pm at the car).

There was a sense of satisfaction in having completed the trip but we had certainly made full use of the long summer days.
