Trip Grades

Grade of trips can depend on many factors, most especially the weather and state of the track. As a guide, a reasonably proficient trumper would be expected to cover the graded trips in about the following times: Easy (E) 3 – 4 hours, Medium (M) 5 – 6 hrs, Fit (F) about 8 hrs, Fitness Essential (FE) >8 hrs. (Tech) refers to trips graded technical requiring either special skills and / or gear.

Members are reminded that a charge for transport will be collected on the day of the trip, the amount depending on the distance traveled and vehicles used. Leaders should be able to give an estimate in advance.

It seems a good place to have our midwinter festivities, on the 17th and 18th of this month.

SNOW CRAFT COURSES Being competent on snow opens up a wider field of tramping: from day walks on the Ruahine tops and Ruapehu's slopes in winter: to trans-alpine summer or winter trips in the Southern Alps. The dates for the three snowcraft courses have been finalized (as on Events' Card). They have been spaced at fortnight intervals this year so that there is continuity from one to the next allowing members and prospective members to progress from one to the next while everything is fresh in their minds. Part of a club night-next month will be on snowcraft.

Content of each snowcraft course is (briefly and hopefully):

SC1 (22-23 July): Intro to the ice axe, kicking steps/cutting steps, ascending/descending easy to moderate slopes, self arresting, snow and alpine conditions. Plus a chance to investigate the slopes of Ruapehu.

SC2 (5-6 August): Basic crampon use including self arresting with crampons, intro to rope work, belaying on snow, French methods (sounds interesting!), intro to glacier travel. And some climbing on Egmont.

SC3 (.19-20 August): Further crampon techniques, more belay methods, some activity on ice. Planning and practising pitches by ascending a peak or two on Ruapehu. All good stuff so contact the leaders soon. P.S. Don't

forget if you want a copy of the Mountaincraft Manual at the discounted price through the club let Terry (356~3588) or Nigel (326-8847) know soon so we can send an order away.

SNOW CRAFT COURSES

This is a preliminary note that the annual series of snowcraft courses will begin with Snowcraft 1 on the weekend of 22-23 July, with Snowcraft 2 and 3 a fortnight and four weeks later respectively. It is hoped that all those club members and prospective members who are new to the alpine world of snow will avail themselves of the opportunity to come on these progressive courses. Being competent on snow opens up a wider field of tramping: from day walks on the Ruahine tops and Ruapehu's slopes in winter; to trans-alpine summer or winter trips in the Southern Alps.

For those who are contemplating these courses the FMC "Mountaincraft Manual" is invaluable. They are considerably discounted if purchase direct from FMC (just over \$9). The club will send away for a bulk order. Let Terry or Nigel know soon.

CLUB NIGHTS

At the AGM it was resolved that club nights will be standardised on the second and last Thursdays of the month. This will come into effect from July because the club nights for the first half of the year have been specified in the current trip card.

TRIP REPORTS

Don't forget (leaders) please get your trip reports in or use your short lived powers to delegate to an unsuspecting team member. How about a letter to the editor, perhaps, or some good gossip, or a poem or what ever. Electronic copy is the most convenient. This newsletter is prepared using Wordperfect. So I can retrieve any material in Wordperfect format (version 5, 5.1, 5.2 or 6, in either DOS or Windows). If you use Microsoft Word or a MAC, then I need an ASCII (or DOS text file) version. With a MAC, you will need a DOS formatted disc. I can only handle 3½ inch discs.

If you have DOS or Windows, and are not sure that you have saved it in ASCII format, then retrieve it into Notepad (Windows) or Edit (DOS) to check the copy. If it's OR, it's OK, if it's not, it's not!

TRIP DECISIONS?

If you decide you want to go on a trip, please ensure that you have contacted the leader by the Wednesday before, so that logistical decisions can be made. Recently, there have been some instances of people expressing an interest in a trip on the evening before - the leaders in some cases, having made other plans at that late stage.

RULES FOR PHOTO COMPETITION

1. Slides must not have been entered previously.
2. All entries must be related to tramping, skiing or climbing.
3. All slides must have a cross on the bottom left hand corner of the mount for normal viewing (i.e. top right hand corner when loaded into the carousel).
4. There is a limit of 3 slides per person per category and no limit on prints.

Categories:

1. Alpine (NZ) Predominately alpine scenery in NZ i.e. above bushline.
2. Scenic (NZ) scenes of natural pictorial interest in NZ hills, coasts, etc. Predominately below the snowline.
4. Natural History (NZ) NZ flora or fauna.
5. Topical (NZ) People in tramping, climbing, or skiing-related activities in NZ.
6. Overseas alpine or scenic Related to tramping etc. overseas.
7. Overseas people Climbers or people met while tramping, climbing overseas.

Formats: Slides, black and white prints, colour prints. Prints do not need to be mounted.

You will note that this year we have included a separate overseas category. So go through your photos and find something to capture the audience's imagination. Prints may be judged as one group or separated at the judges discretion, depending on numbers.

TRIP COSTS

The May issue of the Automobile Association magazine contained their latest estimates of motoring costs. Most vehicles would be in the 1600-2000 cc range. The estimates of costs below cover distance related costs only - not standing charges. The distances are approximate and the cost charged at the discretion of the driver. Where multiple vehicles are taken to a common destination, the drivers should ensure that payments are "equalised" in terms of the various numbers in the various vehicles.

There are some gaps in this list, so next time you head to one of these destinations, perhaps set your trip meter and let us have the distance.

TRIP REPORTS

HOLDSWORTH - JUMBO, MAY 19 – 20 1995

There is a breed of Wellington trampers who believe in Friday night starts, frequently by torchlight. For generations, huts an hour or two's walk in from the road end would be a bustle of activity from dusk to midnight, sometimes later. Then there would be an early start on Saturday and a good, solid Tararua tramp. One of the joys of tramping trips based from PN are the Saturday morning starts, much more civilised I think. However, we had the promise of a super duper day for Saturday and some friends from Wellington were doing a Holdsworth Mitre, starting from Powell Hut on Friday night, so we headed South to join them. Saturday, damn it, was misty. Our plans for Angle Knob - Broken Axe Pinnacles squelched away in the mud. We followed the well worn track in the tussock to Jumbo, reached in an hour from Powell, then the others continued North to Blanchford Hut. The few patches of blue sky did not fool us and we were soon dining on gourmet "stodge" in Jumbo Hut. It was only semi-miserable weather there so we descended the old track to the Atiwhakatu Stream. Delightful forest and down next to the stream campsites to match, much better in fact than the Atiwhakatu Hut. From there the "super highway" began, a metalled, graded, bridged track right out to the car. Needless to say, we didn't muck about. The weather tried to clear, but not hard enough.
