UP AND COMING TRIPS & EVENTS

Trip Grades

Grades of trips can depend on many factors, most especially the weather and state of the track. As a guide, a reasonably proficient tramper would be expected to cover the graded trips in about the following times:

Easy (E): 3-4 hrs Medium (M): 5-6 hrs Fit (F): about 8 hrs

Fitness Essential (FE): >8 hrs

(T) refers to technical trips requiring special skills and/or gear.

Beginners should start with Easy Grade trips.

converted from one software format to another, or the safest bet is to just cut-and-paste your text directly into your e-mail message.





1999 SNOWCRAFT COURSES

The Club will be running three Snowcraft training weekends again this year. SC1 is for Beginners and those wanting confidence for tramping and basic survival in snow conditions; SC2 is Intermediate and includes basic rope work for alpine tramping; SC3 is Advanced and includes more skills for mountaineering.

The three weekends combine into a comprehensive Snowcraft Course with each weekend a prerequisite for the next. SC1 and SC2 will be preceded by Introductory Briefing sessions on the Tuesday night before each weekend.

The weekends will be run similar to club trips to provide an authentic atmosphere. Instructors will team up with 2-3 students for instruction and generally the same groups will prepare their own meals and share other hut chores.

Cost will be \$70-\$140 for each weekend to cover costs for transport, accommodation, food, gear hire, and club instructors.

ANNUAL PHOTO COMPETITION


Yes its that time of year again! We've seen glimpses of some real winner photos & slides from club members over the past year, so come along and enjoy them, and bring your own!

The club's annual photo competition will be held at the club night on Thursday, June 24. The usual rules for the competition apply:

- Slides/prints must not have been entered previously
- All entries must be related to tramping, skiing or climbing
- All slides must have a cross on the bottom left-hand corner of the mount for normal viewing (ie. top right-hand corner when loaded into the carousel)
- All slides and photos must be labelled (on back for photos!) with author's name, and entry category chosen from list below. NOTE: Slides and prints not marked prior to judging in the manner outlined here WILL BE REJECTED (sorry but this is essential to facilitate smooth running of the event).
- Limit of 3 slides per person per category, but no limit on prints.

Categories:

- 1. Alpine (NZ). Predominantly alpine scenery in NZ (ie. above bushline)
- 2. *Scenic (NZ)*. Scenes of natural pictorial interest in NZ hills, coasts, etc. (ie. predominantly below the bushline)
- 3. Natural History (NZ). NZ flora & fauna, or detail of interest eg. geology, ice formations, etc.

- 4. *Topical (NZ)*. People in tramping, climbing, or skiing related activities in NZ.
- 5. Overseas Alpine or Scenic. Related to tramping, etc. overseas or Scenic
- 6. Overseas People. Climbers or people met while tramping, climbing overseas.

Formats: Slides, black-and-white prints, colour prints. Prints do not need to be mounted. Prints may be judged as one group or separated at the judge's discretion, depending on numbers.

The system for judging winners is a democratic one – a show of hands, after the guiding advice of our guest photographic expert.

ACCESS TO SEAL COLONY AT TURAKIRAE HEAD (WELLINGTON)

A formal access agreement between DoC, Hutt City Council, and Orongorongo Station has resulted in formal access allowing people to walk from Wainuiomata Coast Rd carpark across a private bridge and along a signposted route to the reserve. Safe access to the seal colony was temporarily cut by the station owner in 1997 because some people were damaging fences, driving over farmland and harrassing stock.

No dogs, vehicles, motorcycles, bikes or firearms will be permitted on the track. Anybody venturing on to the inland side of the fence will be trespassing.

TRIP REPORTS

MAHARAHARA CROSSING

Before us was a high, steep, dark green, forested, cloud-capped mountain range, the Southern Ruahines. A daunting sight for the faint hearted—we were going to try to cross to the other side on foot. SAR MANAGEMENT COURSE

10 -11 April

Following on from the SAREX and the Search Methods training weekend that club members have been on recently, I was the club nominee to attend the regional Search and rescue management course, held in Wanganui. There were club and police personal from Hawkes Bay, Levin, Wanganui and Taranaki as well as PNTMC and MTSC. It was geared towards Search advisors, Field controllers and SAR team leaders.

Lots of new methods: determining the urgency of a possible search, pre-planning for searches, scenario analysis, establising search areas, search methods (eg confinement, passive search, segmentation), POA's, PODS, ROWs etc. The 300m team - very frequently the lost party is found very close to the last place they were sighted or where last known to be. Lost person behavior - different types of people (children, experienced trampers, young trampers), all react differently when lost - so search methods need to be tailor-made. And much more.

It was run by Emergency Managemrent Ltd. Highly worth while. Some of the techniques can be used at our Overdue trips contact level, and of course by team leaders and team members in SAR's.
