28<sup>th</sup> August DAY TRIP TO WAIOPEHU HUT

After listening to the pessimistic weatherman Saturday and fully preparing ourselves mentally for a wet Sunday, we were somewhat surprised to find sun and blue skies for our drive down to Levin.

We left our car at 9.00 a.m. and made our way up the Waiopehu track to arrive at Edwards Shelter by midday and lunch. By a democratic vote after lunch, we decided to tramp for another hour to arrive at the Waiopehu Hut by 2.00 p.m. If anybody is kinky enough to like mud, then we can thoroughly recommend this track to you (as one or two in the party who ended up in the stuff can testify.)

After a quick trip down, we arrived back at the car soon after 5.30 p.m.

20<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup> August SNOWCRAFT II MOUNT EGMONT

The weather was perfect, snow conditions were satisfactory and the turn out embarrassingly large. Twelve persons made use of our bookings in Kapuni Lodge and the overflow of 14 were catered for in the new Konini Lodge at Dawson Falls.

On Saturday we revised the basics – walking in steps, cutting steps, the self arrest (head first on your back on frozen snow!) and the foot brake belay. Then, for the more experienced, we tried out crampons and the icescrew belay.

On Sunday, shortly after 8.00 a.m. part of the party left for the summit. Our twit of a leader forgot to remind us that we should take our climbing ropes. Fortunately this was discovered soon and was rectified. The slopes up to Fantham's Peak were of frozen snow quite icy in fact and a little unnerving in their steepness for some. Above Fantham's it was soft powder and we took turns at breaking the trail as we zig-zagged our way up.

A strong breeze on the summit made things very cold so no one lingered long admiring the view. Two of the party scratched around on the Crater face of Shark's Tooth but decided conditions weren't suitable for climbing the near vertical ice. All too soon it was time to go home.
