Tension was in the air. All were worried about the safety of Club member Kim Davies and his father who had not returned from a day trip on Friday. Misty weather meant the helicopter could only drop us one hour's walk from Ngamoko Bivouac, from where our search was to begin.

A search around the biv and the spur revealed nothing (it's hard to find "lost" parties who are running away from you in a fog!) So we proceeded to cover the rest of our search area as well as we could with only 100 m. visibility. All that resulted from a day's searching was a possible find by Mike Rochelle's group, so we headed back to the biv to put us in a better position for tomorrow's activities. A dead mouse decomposing in a bucket drove us out and we spent the night under a fly.

Similar weather conditions remained on Sunday and we were asked to search the area which the "Manawatus" attempted to search on the previous day but hadn't because they were 3 km. Away (lost!)

We then made the first definite find of the search – some smelly, holed socks which the sloppy old litterbugs had spilled some stew on. They also left a handkerchief and some foot-prints lying around, and we soon found Kim in a “delirious” condition, vague about the whereabouts of his father. After making him comfortable, two of the party resumed searching and soon found Mr. Davies, “unconscious and suffering from hypothermia” (or that’s what he told us.) The other parties were all called to the area and the injured man was carried to a helicopter landing site where he, Kim and the search parties were taken to base for lunch and debriefing.

The P.N.T.M.C. Rescue Squad consisted of Dianne Stanley, Grant Ramsey, David Speller and Eric Van Toor.
