TRIP REPORTS:

Where has all the snow gone

Loading their well laden packs into the four wheel drive at Lily Bank Station they travelled up the Godley Valley and were dropped at Red Stag Hut. Strange, that the driver smiled as 5 pairs of ski-mountaineering skis were unloaded, and he commented that there was usually 60 cm of snow around the hut at this time of the year. The thoughts of 'The lake... will it be frozen?" lingered in their minds. They would know soon enough.

Spending the night in the cramped four bunk hut, the pre-breakfast visitors of the feathered variety seemed overly interested in mountaineering. Travelling by foot towards the head of the valley with backs straining under the weight they arrived at Godley Hut for lunch. Already the lack of snow in the valley had taken its toll, and bashed feet were tenderly cared for.

The afternoon jaunt to look at the lake which they planned to ski across was daunting – a rubber raft would be more useful than skis!!

With a reasonable weather forecast from Mountain Radio Service that evening they geared up for the next morning – a reacy for the climb on D 'Archaic. Climbing to approx. 7000ft they returned to the hut confident the steps would hold for use the following morning. A lousy forecast, high winds and rain dampened the plans (as it continued to do so for the whole trip). The morning start found slushy snow and small point release avalanches had obliterated the tracks and eventually travel upward was aborted and the safety of the hut sought.

An early morning tip-toe across the Godley River was made heading for Classen Saddle but thwarted by deteriorating weather and a stop at Classen Biv planned. Only there is no Biv there now so onwards to the National Park's hut across the Classen River (not as cold as the Godley).

Some concern over the snow conditions on Classen Saddle was expressed and Armadillo Saddle settled on as an alternative. The morning brought a change of plans and Nigel headed to Red Stag where Linda was due to arrive during the day. Upon meeting a decision was made to head for the more pleasant surrounds at Weka Hut further down the Godley River.

Meanwhile Mike, Daryl and Cass disgarded surplus gear (including skis!) at a drop in the Godley and headed for Armadillo. A wet bivy brought all the group together again in the relative luxury at Weka Hut.

A long slog back to Lily Bank Station and across the McCauley to the cars.

Although it had rained all day Daryl, Nigel and Linda still took a dip in the river before heading to Tekapo and Unwin Hut for a shower.

A pleasant trip – not a lot of snow – not a lot of climbing – not a lot of good weather, but plenty of fun.

A week in the Saddle

Timing is of critical importance to the success of any expedition (i.e. being in the right place at the right time). Club member Kevin Pearce, former members Nic Bishop (Christchurch) and Chrissie Williams (Hamnen) and non-member Nigel King(Timaru) were at Tasman Saddle Hut, Mount Cook National Park, for the week of 15 -22 September. The weather was fine for the whole of this week and skiing conditions were excellent. Aylmer, Hochstetter Dome and Walter were climbed and a visit was made to the Murchison Valley. An attempt on Elie de Beaumont was curtailed because of slow progress in variable snow. Nic took 5 rolls of slides including a panorama using a tripod from the summit of Walter. Chrissie damaged her knee while turning at low speed on a gentle slope having previously safely negotiated much more exciting slopes.

22 - 23 September – No Peaks Trips

Well we did climb Te He:u Heu but this was hot one of the accepted three peaks referred to in the classic 'Three Peaks Trip' in the Tongariro National Park. One is meant to climb the main peak of Ruapehu; Tahurangi, as well as Ngauruhoe and Tongariro over the course of the weekend.

What went wrong? (1 mark) (a) Old age i.e. lack of fitness or (b) Lack of commitment or (c) White out conditions.

Congratulations, you guessed it; it was (c) 'White out conditions'. Having ascended the Whakapapa Glacier to the Glacier Shelter and continued to the slopes of Dome we very nearly stepped over a drop of some feet without seeing it!

Thereafter we proceeded much more cautiously to the new Dome Shelter and awaited for an improvement in the visibility; we awaited this improvement in our sleeping bags. On emerging mid morning Sunday (with the intention of returning to the 'Top of the Bruce') we found that we could actually distinguish between snow and sky for up to 30 metres. In fact an Auckland climbing School group were out and about so we plugged across the Plateaux and ascended Te Heu Heu.

Pairing up the group spent a few hours climbing the gullies and ridges of the Pinnacles. As always it was too good to be true, the higher the group climbed the lower the cloud came bringing on white-out conditions once more.

It was back to the Hut for late lunch and down to the cars for a short journey to the hot pools for a soak, and then back to Palmerston North.
