TRIP REPORTS:

30 November – Hikurangi Range

After the fun of using the flying fox across the Kawhatau River the climb up the track to the Hikurangi Tops was very hard work. The hot muggy conditions seemed to promise the rain which had been predicted by the weatherman and also the lady at the farm at the head of the Kawhatau Valley Road. The sun still shone upon the tops as we sought the spur and track to the Crow Hut. This somewhat old and now indistinct track was located within the bush on an offshoot of the major spur exactly where the map marked it. However we only lost it 3 or 4 times on the trip down.

We disturbed the resident rat at Crow Hut but it made good its escape before we thought of a means to attack it.

Another steep grunt in hot muggy conditions took us onto the Mokai Patea Range; the Hikurangi Range was then rapidly enveloped in cloud but the ranges to the north were still bathed in sunshine. The race was on; would we escape without a soaking? Twice the mist descended on the Mokai Patea and there were two short showers before the clag retreated to the Hikurangi Range. Thus we were able to reach Colenso Peak and later the Forest Service Base unmolested.

1 December Honeycomb Rock Walkway

This was not a Club trip, but the Cloughs were fortunate to attend the official opening of this new Walkway on the coast about 50 miles South-east of Carterton. The walkway itself is over the beach and paddocks on what the geologists describe as a raised beach, backed by the steep hills of the former shoreline. After about 2½ hours we reached the Honeycomb Rock itself, a strange outcrop of sedimentary rock which whose surface has been pitted like a honeycomb by the erosion of air-borne sand. The remains of a lighthouse (now removed) are still visible on top of the rock, but presumably it didn't do its job very well, since only 200 yards up the beach is the rusting bulk of wrecked freighter!
