A Late Account of the 'Summits for Suffrage' Weekend - February 13/14

On Friday evening, a brave Dave joined 5 females going up to the mountain. We arrived in a wonderful evening sunset. Saturday dawned perfect. Llew and Jenny Prichard attempted to find us still asleep - but we were up. Plans were made. Dave, Llew and Jenny raced off to go to Ruapehu from the Whakapapa side (see Jenny's account of this). Monica and Pauline decided to go up Ngauruhoe - we left a little later and started walking up to the saddle about 10 am. Weather was perfect - but perhaps a bit too hot. No clouds, Egmont stood out so clearly - it seemed so close. Not too many people on the way up - they had all started out earlier.

The only problem plodding up the side of Ngauruhoe was keeping out of the way of people (which included what must have been a battalion of whatever of the army) and rocks coming down. The views were never ending on the top. We walked around the inside rim and then the outside - fascinating. We ended up spending about 2 hours there. Coming down was a bit quicker and we strode back to the car in yet another perfect evening.

Sunday was overcast but we decided to use the morning and look at Blythe Hut - a pleasant walk through beech forest and over board walks covering swamp areas, waterfalls to see and ladders to climb. A bit colder and damper than the previous day. Trish and Dave decided to jog back part of the way - the test was, would they reach the road end going the long way before Monica and Pauline arrived via the short way and the car? They didn't - but they were not that far behind - a good preparation run for the Kaweka Challenge.

Pinus Contorta Weekend - March 13/14 by Pauline Coy

The people are interesting and you pick up lots of interesting snippets - the cone seeds can survive for 10+ years and that is why periodic sweeps (say every three years) of volunteers pulling out the seedlings have to be done. All ages went - 15+ - some of us had birthdays so there was plenty of nice food around. The walk from the car to the area of weeding was about one hour away so we had some exercise. A recommended weekend.

Southern Ruahine Day Trip

An early start was organised for a day trip into the Tamaki and Pohangina catchments. Dave and Monica were keen to see Cattle Creek Hut while I was determined to find the lost track. The Tamaki road end is one of the highest used road ends in the Southern Ruahines and we set off early to avoid the heavy foot traffic and to secure a car park. The walk up to Stanfield Hut was easy going up the West Tamaki River. From Stanfield Hut, travel to the

low saddle was easy and from this point two routes to Cattle Creek are available. From the saddle I found the lost track which heads for the Takapari high point. Dave and Monica headed off to Cattle Creek while I headed up to Takapari. The lost track was a little overgrown and travel was difficult in places. Weather conditions did not allow for much of a view on arrival at the top, however Centre Creek could be seen. I wandered toward the A-frame. On the way and after a quick stop I found two hunters in the leatherwood in a somewhat distressed condition. After a friendly wave I headed to the A-frame for lunch. Finally we all met up at the car. Dave reported that Cattle Creek Hut had surprisingly few people visit over the summer; which is interesting considering that it is so accessible. Overall access and improvements in the huts in the area have certainly increased the usage of the lower Tamaki, yet there is still some spots which have little usage and these tend to be places worth seeing.

Waterfall Hut - 20/21 March by Chris Saunders

An excellent weather forecast gave us high hopes for the weekend and Saturday morning dawned fine and clear. The Ruahine tops stood out starkly in the light and shadow as we drove to the Waipawa River car park. Away up the river at 9.30am and the steady climb up the valley along piles of eroded Ruahine greywacke saw us lunch at the start of the short bush track to the Waipawa Saddle. A few white clouds floated across the sky from the west and a light wind sprang up. Still we were sure we would get good views of the Hikurangi Range from the saddle - no such luck - the westerly was already bringing in thick cloud. With parkas on in the cool conditions and on up to the ridge leading south from Three Johns. The climb up to onto the unnamed peak (1635m) was a scramble through long tussock and numerous Spaniards - a painful experience for those who had not been on the tops before. The walk across to Rangiateatua (1702 m) with its rocky approach was much easier travel. On the south side of this peak were patches of snow from the previous Thursday's storm. A steep descent to Rang Saddle - a rock scramble - climbing backwards down a gut and a scree slide and we were at the saddle. The mixture of rock, tussock and Spaniards made travel down to the bushline track rather slow but once we were in Rangi Creek, it was a fairly speedy trip down and around to Waterfall Hut. We reached the hut at about 6 pm.

Waterfall Hut is a most attractive situation on the true right bank of the upper Kawhatau Valley. Attractive beech forest, open grassy flats and dramatic mountain tops give the place a South Island feel.

After a good nights rest we were up at dawn (6.45 am for us) and away on our return - back to Rangi Saddle. Westerly rain and gale force wind on the exposed tops, a quick stop in a sheltered spot at the saddle and then down to the Waterfall Hut for lunch. After negotiating hundreds more Spaniards and crossing the stream heaps of times we arrived at the hut for early lunch. Then it was up to the Waipawa Saddle along the more open stream and followed by a steep ascent to the saddle. The wind tried hard to blow us over and to varying extents succeeded. From the saddle it was a quick trip down the Waipawa to the car park.

An excellent weekend through new country for all of us, except for Peter who showed great understanding for the three members of the team who had not been tramping in such terrain before. The other members of the party were: Haydon Roy, Natasha Lamb, Tineka Panchaud and Chris.
