Stroll around the world-famous in NZ predator-proof reserve at Bushey Park near Wanganui, led by two experienced birders who can help you spot and count the native avifauna. We hope to see rare stitchbird, saddleback, native robin, inter alia. Be a citizen scientist tramper for a day and contribute to the national (Atlas) bird survey.

Sat 23rd October - Mon 25th October Labour weekend trip:

Te Araroa Levin to Otaki ForksMedium/FitRoy Rolston027 476 7188

We attempt this 3-night, 4-day section again after it was postponed in favor of a plan B last Easter weekend. This Te Araroa section has the reputation for being the most challenging in the North Island, but it is also reported by many to be the most rewarding. The weather plays a big part as some of the route is very exposed to inclement conditions - when it's good the scenic views are some of the best the trail offers.

The trail starts at the end of Poads Road near Levin with approx 6 - 8 hour tramp up to our first night at Te Matawai hut. The second day climbs up to the main range and passes through goblin forest to our second night stop at Nichols Hut. The third day travels south along the main range and over Mt Crawford 1462m, the highest and most exposed point before descending to our third night stop at Waitewaewae Hut. Day 4 we tramp out to Otaki Forks and along the road and past a road slip yet to be repaired to a temporary road end to meet a pre-arranged pickup person or vehicle.

Note this trip includes an extension of Labour weekend to 4 days and is weather dependent, meaning I will postpone and or consider a shorter 3 day plan B alternative if needed. Trip Grades

Trip grades depend on many factors, especially weather and terrain. A reasonably proficient tramper should expect to do the trips in the following times:

Easy (E):3-4 hrsMedium (M):5-6 hrsFit (F):about 8 hrsFitness Essential (FE):over 8 hrs

Other Grades:

Technical skills (T)

Family (Fam)

Trip participants

Contact the leader at least 3 days in advance. Trips usually leave from Milverton Park. A charge for transport will be collected on the day.

Gear for trips

Minimum gear for day trips is appropriate footwear, pack, lunch and snacks, waterproof jacket, overtrousers, gloves, warm hat, torch, toilet paper, matches or a lighter, sunblock, first aid kit, and a survival bag or space blanket. Each person needs to be equipped to survive overnight.
